MICHAEL 7460

My story notes on a stellar career

I first met Michael while traveling for the Arabian Horse Owners Foundation. When in Florida I visited Max Culpepper who owned him at the time. Michael had been trained for pleasure and won consistently in open competition. At 4 years old, Max rode him in the Florida 100 mile endurance ride, which is a particularly grueling event. The deep sand, rocky terrain, extreme heat and humidity proved too much for many of the contenders. Even the most fit lost condition. Michael won that ride with no loss of condition, and went on to win the following two years as well, to retire the challenge trophy. The replacement was the named the "Michael" trophy.

At the time of my visit, Michael was training with famed Western trainer and championship competitor Monte Foreman at his facility nearby. Monte was also teaching Max how to ride him. I was offered to ride and there began my love affair with Michael. This was the most agile, responsive, fast, athletic body I had ever put my legs around. I was doing figure 8's, roll backs, gallops and stops, with my legs, shifting of weight in the saddle, and intention, but very little rein. I grew up on the backs of my Dad's horses, usually bareback and a halter, using my legs and feel to communicate. Despite their size, horses are very sensitive and respond to leg and body movement. Michael had that squared. He was also an independent spirit. Monte told me that you don't tell Michael to do something, you ask him. We got along great.

Monte was showing him in open competition, and many an owner and trainer who stood at the rail to scoff at an Arabian attempting to ever better a Quarter Horse, had to tip their hats as Michael repeatedly took the Championships.

When Max had to sell Michael, I was back in Maryland helping plan a program for the launch of Arabian racing. I bought him and put him into race training. He lost but one race, to Ofir by a nose, when he had the flu. They shouldn't have run him, but needed the horses. Michael bettered that and went on to hold the track record for 2½ miles. He had not only endurance but was a true drinker of the wind, ready to go on and on. As his jockey said at the end of the race at Washington Park in Chicago where Michael was 15 lengths ahead of the second place horse, he was just hitting his stride, and could have gone another 2½ miles. What heart! And there again, the thoroughbred race trainers were at the rail laughing at any horse that could run twice as far as any they could manage, looking in wonder as these "useless" little Arabians went around the track and around again to the finish, having suffered no ill effects.

Monte asked to take Michael on the road with him. Much as I wanted him home, he was blazing a trail for the breed and I could not shortchange that potential. Monte was competing in Open Stock Horse competition. He trained and competed with all breeds, but Michael did more winning than with any of the others. Monte said he finally ended up in the black at the end of a season. Michael was always ready.

He put on training clinics across the country, using Michael to show students his techniques and their application as they progressed. Monte had photographed and dissected the movement of horses through their various activities, to learn what muscles responded to what movements and to what pressures and movement of the rider's body. Michael's responsiveness offered him the opportunity to display them easily. He videoed Michael's "work", but they were destroyed during a rain storm when Monte accidentally left them in the open window of his trailer.

At this point, Michael had traveled so many miles and done so much. A triple Champion — endurance, performance, and racing — with yet with not a pimple on his legs and being fit and unblemished as ever, he could have done more. He could easily have been a Park Horse had I any interest in going there (which I did not!). He could extend for speed or collect for high action, but he no longer liked being trailered, and let us know "enough".


I wanted him home to enjoy his days on green grass, a paddock and barn of his own, and some mares to breed. I rode him through the beautiful park my

husband and I developed in the back country of Greenwich, Connecticut, and looked out at him from my office window overlooking his paddock. I'm not sure how much work I did not get done, constantly fascinated watching him, the ease and freedom of the way he moved, his whole body like one smooth flowing part, and honestly, his mind seemed on some higher level.

Thinking back, I could have used him more had I not been so deep into the program I already had in place. Perhaps he would have produced a line of athletes of his own. Yet more often these are one-of-a-kind happenings that stand alone on the pages of history.

There is no other Michael.


